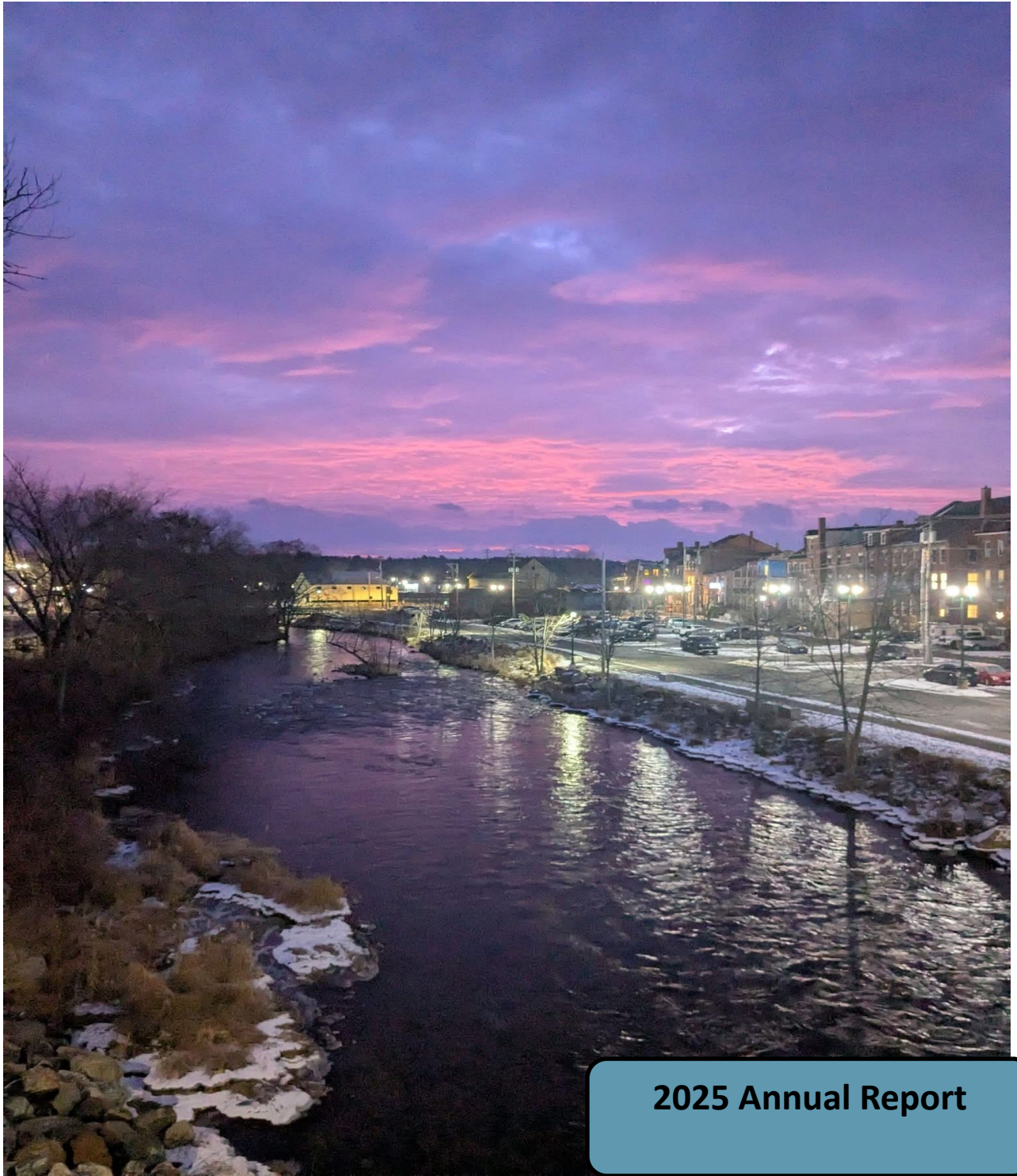

Dedication for the 2025 City of Gardiner Annual Report:



On behalf of the City Council, it is my distinct honor to dedicate the 2025 City of Gardiner Annual Report to Annie Cough, a longtime resident and volunteer of our city. Annie’s contributions to Gardiner are numerous, and her care and concern for her neighbors are truly remarkable.

Annie was born and raised in Gardiner, graduated from Gardiner Area High School, and began her professional career working at the Gardiner Public Library in high school and while pursuing a degree from the University of Maine at Augusta. She went on to a long career of public service at the Maine State Library, where she currently serves as a Customer Service Representative II in the Circulation Department. In this role, Annie works diligently to help patrons find the books, materials, and information they need. She is known for her impeccable customer service and her keen curiosity, which she uses to find solutions for every request. Her coworkers frequently sing her praises, sharing stories such as Annie delivering newspapers to a patron in the hospital so they would not miss their daily news.

Annie shares her skills and interests generously with the Gardiner community and throughout greater Kennebec County by preserving and sharing the stories of our past. She has been a board member of the Kennebec Historical Society for 20 years, serving as its Program Chair for 15 years. She has stewarded the histories of Gardiner’s cemeteries—both well-known sites such as Oak Grove and St. Joseph’s, as well as lesser known places like Plaisted Cemetery, where the poor were buried in unmarked graves. Annie researches these histories, shares their stories with the community, and passionately advocates for the respect these sacred grounds deserve.

For many years, Annie has led a group of volunteers to place flags on veterans’ graves in the spring and lay wreaths in December to honor and pay respect for those who served our country. She has been an active member of the local Wreaths Across America group, cataloguing veteran histories and grave sites to preserve their memories.

While her commitment to community service and local history is steadfast, perhaps Annie’s most cherished quality is her genuine care for others. She visits the infirmed at home, acquaintances in long term care facilities, and delivers the church bulletin to those unable to attend Sunday services. Annie checks on neighbors during her daily walks through the neighborhoods. Her “patrol,” as she jokingly calls it, takes her past many homes and businesses, where she is known as a friendly face and a thoughtful conversationalist. She freely shares the histories of local houses and old homesteads with current residents and neighbors. Though she knows Gardiner’s history well, Annie is most proud to say that she knows not just the history—but the people who make the community what it is today.

For all the care, compassion, and dedication she shares, we are proud to dedicate the 2025 City of Gardiner Annual Report to Annie Cough—Gardiner resident, librarian, historian, and friend to all.

City Council meetings are typically held on the first and third Wednesday of each month. They take place at City Hall, 6 Church Street, and begin at 6pm. Council meetings are available on our website to watch and listen live. They are also archived for your convenience. Council Definitions

Ordinance– A law enacted by a municipal legislative body, such as a city council or county commission. Ordinances govern matters not already covered by state or federal laws such as zoning, safety and building regulations. A municipal ordinance is equivalent to a state statute/law. On-going until voted by the body to amend or repeal.

Order– A formal vote by a municipal body, such as a city council or board of selectmen, instructing that something be done, issuing a formal directive that some action occur. Usually refers to a one-time action by the body, such as an order to transfer funds from one account to another.

Resolve/Resolution– Expressing an opinion or endorsement of an action or sentiment, expressing that something should be done, non-binding.

Assessing Department

Curt Lebel, City Assessor

The Assessing Department operates under the Finance Department of the City of Gardiner.

The City Assessor is responsible for determining the equalized value of real estate and personal property that is subject to municipal taxation. In Maine, a large portion of Municipal, School and County budgets are funded by the property tax. The City Assessor, acting as an agent of the State, governed by State Law and local management policy is responsible for the equitable distribution of the property tax between all the taxable properties within the City. Ongoing administrative duties involve the maintenance of property information on parcels within the City, municipal budget cap development, maintenance and determination of captured value of the City's Tax Increment Financing districts and production of GIS maps for City projects. Specific records include legal information regarding ownership, parcel maps, property record cards, sales information, etc.

Property resale values continued to rise during the period preceding the April 1, 2024 (FY25) assessment, but at a slower pace than we observed in the years coming out of the pandemic. An assessment ratio study conducted by Maine Revenue Services showed an 2% decrease (appreciation) in the residential average assessment ratio from the previous year and was reported to be 47% of market value. The City has solicited bids and contracted with KRT Appraisal for a 2027 revaluation. Project start up is expected in the spring of 2026. The growth in taxable valuation base was \$12.8 million from Fiscal year 2024.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Denise Brown, Finance Director

Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 2025

The Finance Department is dedicated to providing the City Manager & City Council, all city departments, business owners, and the residents of Gardiner with fiscal support. The department is responsible for ensuring that all funds are budgeted, expensed, and collected accurately; as well as for all cash reconciliations and investments of the City's funds to ensure proper cash flow and maximum security and liquidity. Other functions of the department include, purchasing, payroll and benefit administration, human resource management, risk management, and debt administration.

Below is an overview of the financial activities of the City of Gardiner for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2025.

- The City's net position at the close of FY25 was \$23,198,413. Of that amount, \$3,670,098 (*unrestricted net position*) could be used to meet the City's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- The governmental funds reported a combined ending fund balance of \$6,374,795.
- The unassigned fund balance for the General Fund was \$3,248,411.
- The City had total long-term debt of \$10,243,363. Of this amount, \$3,959,948 was for governmental activities and \$6,283,415 was for business-type activities.

The FY26 budget resulted in a .70 increase to the tax rate, resulting in a 26.3/mil.

The Finance Director works closely with the City Manager on the budget process and is responsible for the annual estimate of revenue and preparing a balanced budget, in addition to preparing financial statements. The full financial statements from FY25 are available on the City's website. The audit was performed by RHR Smith & Company, Buxton, Maine.

TAX COLLECTOR

Kathleen Cutler, Tax Collector/Deputy Treasurer

Kathleen Cutler serves as the **City Clerk, Tax Collector, and Deputy Treasurer** for the **City of Gardiner, Maine**. The office is responsible for the collection of real estate, personal property, and excise taxes.

Key Responsibilities

The Tax Collector is an appointed public officer whose duties include:

- **Tax Billing & Collection:** Preparing tax bills, sending 30-day demand notices, and administering the "tax club" payment plan.
- **Legal & Finance:** Filing tax liens, processing foreclosures, and providing tax information to mortgage holders.

Resident Licensing: Assisting with motor vehicle registrations and licensing for boats, snowmobiles, and ATVs.

The City offers a Tax Club, which allows residents the option to pay their taxes in nine (9) equal payments. All previous accounts must be paid in full before a Tax Club is issued. Tax Clubs may include both Real Estate and Personal Property. On average 135 residents participate in the tax club each year.

In FY25 we sent out 2744 tax bills, 134 liens were filed, and 22 foreclosure notices were sent. In accordance with the State of Maine revised the statute (36 M.R.S. § 943) regarding real estate foreclosures and the Notice of Impending Foreclosure, the City of Gardiner has contracted with a licensed Real Estate Broker to dispose of all tax acquired property.

In FY25 we processed 6192 motor vehicle transactions for a total of \$1,525,408.

We continue to work on outreach with elderly residents and are always looking for ways to provide tax relief. The city currently offers a Tax Discount Program. In 2025 38 residents qualified for relief and received a combined \$17,705 in refunds. For information on this program please call city hall.

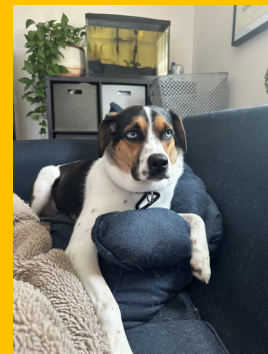

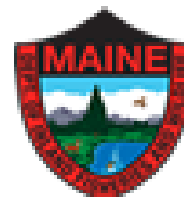

General Assistance is designed to provide specific amount of aid for basic needs during a limited period of time and is not intended to be an ongoing resource. Applications for General Assistance can be taken any time during normal City Hall Business hours. Applicants can also call 207-530-0178 after hours for emergencies. Applicants can apply for assistance with basic needs such as rent, heating fuel, electricity, food, and medication. All recipients must meet the state-mandated requirements to be eligible and are responsible for meeting their own basic needs by any means available before applying for General Assistance.

GARDINER PUBLIC LIBRARY

Gardiner Public Library prides itself on being a vital and welcoming asset to the City of Gardiner and the residents of our partner communities. The beauty of our historic building draws visitors of all ages, but it is what awaits inside that truly sets us apart.

Patrons are greeted by an exceptional team whose kindness, professionalism, and dedication define the library experience. Our full-time staff - Jess Betit, Stacy Caron, Ann Russell, and Heather Wade - are supported by part-time staff Bob Fagan, Barbara Gipson, and Marlene Patten, as well as on-call and seasonal team members Stacia Bolitho, Iris Ireland, and Erin Overlock. Together, they are deeply committed to serving every person who walks through our doors, and their dedication to outstanding customer service is widely appreciated and frequently noted.

Gardiner Public Library serves the City of Gardiner and the five supporting municipalities of Farmingdale, Litchfield, Pittston, Randolph, and West Gardiner. As a truly regional organization, we serve a community of more than 20,000 residents. We are also a significant economic driver for Gardiner's historic downtown and an important asset for those considering a move to the area. We continually adapt and enhance our services to meet the evolving needs and interests of our patrons, ensuring we remain a valued and essential resource for all our supporting towns and subscribing members.

In addition, we proudly support all MSAD 11 schools during the academic year by providing both teacher and student library cards, strengthening literacy, learning, and access to resources across the region.

Our offerings serve the entire community. They range from an excellent in-house collection of books, DVDs, and audiobooks to an extensive interlibrary loan network spanning libraries across Maine, as well as a rich array of digital resources, including eBooks, audiobooks, movies, music, comics, and more.

We also offer a variety of passes to Maine State Parks and regional cultural destinations, including Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens, Farnsworth Art Museum, Boothbay Railway Village, Southworth Planetarium, Kennebec Historical Society, Maine Wildlife Park, and Maine Maritime Museum. These passes allow patrons to explore and enjoy the natural beauty, history, and culture of our region.

Our Library of Things further expands what you can borrow - and we are always adding to it. Current offerings range from practical tools like pole pruners for managing brown tail moth nests, to a metal detector for discovering hidden treasures, to a fly-fishing rod for practicing a new skill.



Programming is a cornerstone of our work. For children, we host weekly story hours on Tuesday mornings, a STEM program on Wednesday mornings, and Baby Bounce on Friday mornings, alongside a vibrant Summer Reading Program and other activities for young people. Teens are invited to a weekly homeschool book group and a Young Adult (YA) afterschool program on Thursdays during the school year, and they are also encouraged to participate in the Summer Reading Program.

Adults enjoy several book groups on Tuesday evenings, as well as rotating training on electronic devices, author readings, historical lectures, and movies for all ages. On Friday mornings, we host a casual coffee chat where community members can talk about books and ideas, learn a new game, meet friends, or simply enjoy getting out of the house. For those unable to visit in person, home delivery services are also available.

Beyond regular programming, we actively engage with the community. We serve as a host site for three annual Art-Walk events, participate as a stop in Gardiner’s Downtown Trick-or-Treat, and organize several annual events, including our fall book sale, the Marjorie Standish Potluck event, and a plant sale with a silent auction. We also sponsor the Feed Your Neighbor fundraising event each March, supporting the Chrysalis Place food pantry.

A defining strength of Gardiner Public Library is its longstanding partnership with the Gardiner Library Association. Since 1881, the Association has owned the library’s land and building, serving as steward of this historic space and ensuring its continued use as a public library. The City of Gardiner provides staffing, training, and day-to-day operational support, including custodial services, snow removal, utilities, and staff development, while the Association oversees major maintenance, preservation efforts, capital improvements, and financial support for library materials and programming. Together, this partnership allows the library to thrive as both a modern public resource and a treasured historic landmark.

With all this in place, Gardiner Public Library has had an exceptional year. Our doors are bustling with patrons from all supporting towns and beyond, and programming for all ages continues to grow. Positive word of mouth brings visitors back again and again, reflecting the value our community places on the library.

This success is made possible through the dedication of our Board of Trustees, the Gardiner Library Association, all its board and committee members, and every advocate and lifelong library supporter. Above all, a public library is only as strong as its staff - and Gardiner Public Library is proud to have one of the finest library teams in the state, providing outstanding service at every turn.

Through teamwork, professionalism, and ongoing development, we are committed to creating a safe and secure community where residents and visitors alike feel protected and supported.

The mission of the Gardiner Fire Department is to proudly serve our community by providing dependable, high-quality public safety services. We are dedicated to protecting lives and property through fire suppression, emergency medical care, disaster response, fire prevention, and public education.

Emergency Responses Gardiner Fire & Rescue is proud to serve a population of approximately 25,742 residents across 173 square miles. In addition to the City of Gardiner, we provide contracted ambulance services to the communities of Litchfield, West Gardiner, Farmingdale, Randolph, Chelsea, Pittston, and Richmond. In 2025, our department responded to: • 3,454 emergency medical calls • 206 fire-related calls Each response represents a neighbor, family member, or visitor in need. We are honored to be trusted with the responsibility of answering those calls—day or night.

Personnel

The Gardiner Fire and Rescue Department is made up of 20 full-time firefighters, supported by a dedicated call company of 4 active members. Our four-shift schedule ensures 24-hour, 365- day coverage, allowing us to respond quickly and effectively whenever the community needs us. Each shift is staffed with five firefighter/paramedics, enabling us to provide both fire protection and advanced life support medical care.

Apparatus & Equipment

To serve our community effectively, the department maintains a well-rounded fleet that includes:

- Two engines
- One 100' ladder truck
- Four ambulances
- One utility/Chief's vehicle
- One UTV
- One boat
- One paramedic fly car/command vehicle



Rescue 1 is currently undergoing a remount process, with its ambulance box being installed on a new chassis. This unit is expected to return to service shortly. Once complete, Rescue 2 will receive the same upgrade. This approach allows the City to responsibly manage resources while ensuring reliable emergency medical transport for the community.

Delivery of a new engine has been delayed and is now expected in spring 2026

Fire Prevention and Education & Community Education

Fire prevention and public education remain a cornerstone of our service. Lieutenant Eric Davis, our Fire Prevention and Education Specialist, has led exceptional outreach efforts throughout the year. Lt. Davis visited all local schools, UpLift programs, and Scout packs, providing age-appropriate fire safety education while giving children hands-on opportunities to explore fire apparatus and equipment. These interactions help build trust, reduce risk, and empower young residents with life-saving knowledge. The Gardiner Fire Department welcomes opportunities to partner with residents, schools, and organizations for fire prevention and safety education programs.

Training – Fire & EMS

Ongoing training ensures our firefighters and paramedics are prepared to safely and effectively serve the community. Through regular company drills, regional training opportunities, and specialized certifications, our personnel maintain the skills needed to respond to fires, rescues, and medical emergencies. All training meets or exceeds state and federal requirements, particularly for operating in Immediately **Dangerous to Life and Health (IDLH)** environments.

Fire Training

Firefighters regularly attend regional classes and seminars. Several members have completed Fire Officer I and II certifications, strengthening leadership within the department. The call company participates in monthly training sessions supported by on-duty crews, and the department continues to collaborate with neighboring agencies through mutual aid training.

EMS Training

The department currently includes:

16 EMT-Paramedics

3 Advanced EMTs

2 Basic EMT's

In 2025, the department hosted training in ACLS, PEPP, BLS/CPR, and AMLS, along with monthly continuing education. Quarterly quality assurance reviews, overseen by Medical Director Dr. Kelly Meehan-Coussee, help ensure the highest standard of patient care for our community.

Vision for the Future

The future of the Gardiner Fire Department is bright. As our community grows and service demands increase, we are actively exploring opportunities to improve efficiency and sustainability. Discussions with neighboring fire chiefs regarding regional collaboration have been productive and encouraging. Working together may allow us to continue providing high-quality service while responsibly managing costs for our communities.

As of January of 2025 the department was only two officers down compared to 3 or more vacancies that the department has dealt with for large parts of the last few years. In 2025 the department added Matthew Hunt to our department which leaves us with one vacancy. There were two promotions in 2025. Kaleb Marston was promoted to Patrol Sergeant and Christopher Lewis was promoted to Detective. Officer Lewis is currently working the open patrol shift until our final vacant position is filled then he will begin his full time assignment as the departments detective. Once again, the department's crime reduction strategies and our partnership with the community has contributed to another year of reduced incidents of serious criminal offenses. About the Department

The Gardiner Police Department maintains twenty-four hour police protection 365 days a year when at full staff. The eight staff members (2 Sergeants and 6 Patrolman) that are assigned to patrol work 12-hour shifts. We also have a full-time detective, and a part-time, civilian safety officer. The safety officer is a civilian position and works 25 hours a week. For your safety, there are ALWAYS at least 1-2 officers on duty during from 6am-6pm and there are always at least 2 officers on duty from 6pm-6am when at full staff.

The detective is responsible for investigating all major crimes and incidents. His duties also include evidence collection, preservation, and accountability.

The safety officer is a hybrid position that is responsible for animal control, parking enforcement, harbor management and school crossing guard at LER.

Year at a Glance

The Gardiner Police Department responded to an approximately 7,100 calls for service this year. An analysis of those calls for service indicate over 90% of calls are responded to within five minutes. I am extremely proud of the department, and the quality of work the employees produce is outstanding. A call for service is defined as anything that the Gardiner Police Department has done and includes all citizen complaints. Calls for services resulted in:

- ◆ 194 offense reports
- ◆ 233 arrests (an arrest is defined as any time someone is issued a summons with an arraignment court date, any time an individual is arrested on a warrant, probation holds, etc.).
- ◆ 162 motor vehicle accidents (includes reportable and non-reportable damage)
- ◆ 253 parking tickets

The department also issued 4 new Concealed Weapons Permits and 16 renewals/transfers.

Animal Control & Parking Enforcement

The Animal Control Officer (Safety Officer) is in charge of animal welfare, stray and domesticated animals (cats and dogs). Any complaint of a non-domesticated animal will be referred to the Maine Warden Service.

We would like to remind dog owners that per State law, your dog must be registered with the City by Dec. 31 of each year. Please keep your dog on a leash when you are off of your property and please clean up after your dog in order to keep the City's parks clean and enjoyable for all. Please be sure to check out the City's new dog park located on upper Water St., just west of D&H motors, as it is a park just for dogs!

Here are some friendly parking ordinance reminders : there is a 2 hour time limit for parking in the downtown on Water Street. Overnight parking is never allowed in the downtown section of Water Street. It is illegal to park on the sidewalk. It shall be unlawful to park on any street within the City of Gardiner between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight and 6:00 a.m. from November 1st to April 30th regardless of weather conditions. All parking violations found within the City are subject to ticketing and towing, so, please pay attention.

PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS & GROUNDS

John Cameron, Public Works Director

The Public Works Department's primary service is to maintain the city's infrastructure which includes, but not limited to, roads, parks, cemeteries, city buildings, culverts and stormwater basins, and sewer lines and basins. We also help respond to sewer calls, oversee streetlights, and assist in community events.

A few projects that the Public Works Department took care of during 2025 were raising basins prior to paving projects. Weeks Road got chip sealed, which is a cost-effective alternative to paving. After we pave, there is always shoulder work that needs to be done to help keep the roads in good shape. With some of the heavier rain events, there always seem to be more washouts than expected. The crew works very hard to come up with alternatives to try to limit how often and how bad the washouts are.

We set aside a couple of weeks each year to put towards trimming brush along the roadsides and overhead along the roads so residents have good visibility, and the sun can shine on the roads to help keep things dry. This year we were able to purchase a Bush hog to go on the end of the excavator to get some larger brush and to help with the roadside brush. We also purchased a roadside mower for our miniature loaders. Instead of being limited to mowing for one to two weeks a year, we can take care of roadside mowing anytime that we have a chance.

The department focused on storm water and sewer infrastructure on High Holborn St. In preparation for pavement next year. We completed the list of sidewalks to be removed. Identified areas that need to be loomed and seeded next spring. PW did the demo work on Dearborn Park prior to the contractor completing the project. We rebuilt the walkways with a fresh layer of reclaim at the Common.

The City of Gardiner took over Mount Hope Cemetery, and in doing so it created additional mowing and maintenance for the department, so we opted to subcontract some of the mowing, and it worked very well.

This year the department was able to take delivery of a new Western Star dump truck. This is a great addition to the fleet. Many thanks to the residents and the City Council for supporting this acquisition.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY

Steve Aievoli, Director

In 2025 the City of Gardiner Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) treated 451,178,000 gallons of sewage and combined stormwater. That calculates to be an average daily flow of 1,123,528 gallons per day. The Town of Farmingdale contributed 40,554,000 gallons or 11.0% of flow contribution and the Town of Randolph contributed 41,850,000 gallons or 11.35%.

The finished clean water or “effluent” discharged to the Kennebec River was cleaned to an average of 93% removal of Total Suspended Solids (TSS) and 93% of Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD). The final effluent was disinfected to DEP and DMR standards during the period of seasonal chlorination May 10 to September 30 using a combination of Sodium Hypochlorite/Meta Bisulfite. The collection system, or sewers, is comprised of miles of underground piping connected through 18 pump stations, 2 siphons, 4 interceptors, force mains, a stormwater CSO/RTB (Combined Sewer Overflow/Retention & Treatment Basin), a storage interceptor and residential service lines.

The final waste component of the treated sewage is separated and condensed down to a moist, solid material called bio-solids or sludge. A total of 984 cubic yards (18.9 Yd³/week production avg.) and 773 wet tons (14.9 tons/week avg.) were produced in 2024. Current PFAS regulations do not allow for the re-use of bio-solids. This means that 100% of Gardiner’s Biosolids are now being disposed of at the State of Maine owned Juniper Ridge Landfill in Alton, Maine.

The CSO/RTB (Combined Sewer Overflow/Retention and Treatment Basin) project completed in September 2016 at the Maine Avenue Pump Station captured, treated and returned to the system 270,000 gallons of combined sewage and stormwater (CSO flow) that would have otherwise gone untreated out to the Kennebec River. An additional total of 1,412,000 of CSO flow was given basic screening and primary treatment through the CSO system at the treatment plant (primary bypassing secondary) before discharge to the river during one heavy rain/snow melt event. This flow would have been discharged directly to the river without treatment if not for the ability of the treatment plant to bypass secondary treatment and still provide solids removal and primary treatment.

The CSO Master Plan was updated in 2025. This plan is completed every five years and outlines the cities plan for work in the future to remove storm water from the sanitary sewer collection system. The gravity sewer main lines on four streets that are upstream of the Maine Avenue Pump Station where the Combined Sewer Overflow is located were identified and listed in the plan as projects to be completed over the next 5-6 years. Those main lines are located on Spring Street, A portion of West Hill Road, Ash Street and a portion of Central Street

There were several process control improvements implemented throughout the year that improved the quality of the facilities effluent discharge. These improvements were part of the plan to reduce sludge disposal and chemical costs.

The Gardiner WWTF is normally staffed by 5 employees, In February 2025 Steve Aievoli was hired as the Wastewater Superintendent. The facility staff include Todd Lester, Todd was hired as an operator in August and transitioned to the position of Interim Chief Operator in November, Chris Miller is the Mechanic/Operator; Bryden Haskell is the Lab Tech/Operator and Ben Moore is an Operator. Both Bryden and Ben celebrated their 1 year anniversary as employees of the City in November. The residential collection system (sewers) is maintained in part by the Gardiner Public Works Department led by Public Works Director John Cameron, Foreman Dave Grover, Mechanic Kaleb Bouchard, Operator John Zack, Operator Kyle Burns, Operator Tucker Fitzmaurice, Operator Phillip Alley, Operator John Perkins, Laborer Mike McArthur Senior and Laborer Mike McArthur Junior.

Department of Economic and Community Development

Office of Planning and Development

The Gardiner Economic Development Department works to create an environment that encourages economic growth by supporting Gardiner businesses, strengthening our community, and maintaining a high quality of life.

2025 Economic Development Highlights

Dearborn Park, the downtown pocket park between Mechanic Street and Water Street, underwent a complete renovation. The project was primarily funded with a \$100,000 Community Development Block Grant from the Maine Department of Community & Economic Development. These improvements transformed the park into a more vibrant and functional public space, enhancing its role as a community hub for events and everyday use while creating an accessible, welcoming passageway and gathering place for residents, visitors, and businesses alike.

The City of Gardiner sold Lot #12 in the Libby Hill Business Park to Elwell Excavation for \$49,900 in April 2025. The developer has received Planning Board approval to build a 9,600 sq ft warehouse for construction operations. The remaining two City-owned lots in the business park are under contract and pending sale in February 2026.

A Climate Vulnerability Assessment of Gardiner's infrastructure is underway. The project is funded by a \$50,000 Climate Action Grant from the Maine Community Resilience Partnership. Environmental engineers at Haley Ward are conducting the assessment with assistance from an ad hoc committee created for this project. The final assessment report is expected in spring 2026 and will help position the City for future resiliency investments and competitive funding opportunities.

Iron Heights, a multi-family housing project located on the former T.W. Dick Steel property at 1 Summer Street, broke ground in April 2025. Developed by Mastway Development, the Affordable Housing Project will provide 32 new apartments in Gardiner's downtown. The project is expected to be complete by summer 2026 and represents an important investment in housing availability, downtown vitality, and long-term economic growth.

Brownfields Cleanup Assessment Grant funds continued to be used to identify properties where the expansion, redevelopment, or reuse may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant, and to assess mitigation options. Nine properties have been assessed in Gardiner since the program began in 2023, helping remove barriers to redevelopment and unlock future investment potential.

To expand the department's planning capacity, Angelia Christopher transitioned from her role as Administrative Assistant to Planning Coordinator in July 2025. With more than six years of experience serving the City of Gardiner, Angelia brings valuable institutional knowledge and has strengthened the department's ability to support private development projects, land use review, and ordinance administration with greater responsiveness and efficiency.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

The Code Enforcement Office provides services that guide the physical development of Gardiner toward the achievement of community goals. These services include:

Issuing Permits: Review of applications and construction plans for residential, commercial, and industrial buildings and structures

Pre-Construction Inspections: Site conditions, setback verification, building envelope assessment, vegetative cutting, excavation, high water determination, and drainage

Construction Inspections: Foundations, structural framing, insulation, disability accessibility, egress, internal plumbing, septic systems, building alterations, swimming pools, signs, site maintenance, retaining walls, and erosion control

Post-Construction Inspections: Occupancy permits, site stabilization, health and safety, and accessibility compliance

Enforcement of City of Gardiner Code and Land Use Ordinance: Including Floodplain and Shoreland regulations, Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code (MUBEC), Maine Uniform Plumbing Code, Maine Subsurface Wastewater Disposal (septic system) Rules, State Statutes, and Federal Law.

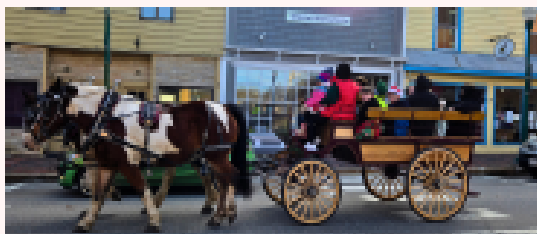

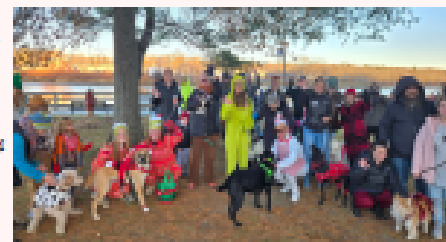

About Us

Boys & Girls Clubs of Kennebec Valley (BGCKV) provides safe, affordable, and high-quality care and out-of-school time programming for children and teens across MSAD 11 and the greater Kennebec Valley. We operate from a new, state-of-the-art 28,000-square-foot Clubhouse and a high school regulation soccer and lacrosse field—both made possible through generous support from individuals, towns, the county, private foundations, state funding, and community project funds. Our doors open at 6:30 a.m. so working families can start their day with reliable care, and our building also serves as a welcoming community meeting space during school hours. The Need

Rural communities need dependable childcare, enriching after-school options, and safe spaces for youth during school breaks, early release days, and summer months. Families also face food insecurity and rising costs, making consistent access to healthy meals and scholarships essential. BGCKV responds to these needs by offering year-round programming, serving meals across the day, and ensuring cost is not a barrier through scholarships and donor-supported programs.

Our Approach

BGCKV supports youth from infancy through high school with a full continuum of care, learning, and enrichment. Our early childhood classrooms provide developmentally appropriate learning through Creative Curriculum and Pre-K for ME, creating fun, nurturing days for our youngest members. School-age children begin their mornings at the Club with breakfast before heading to school, and we remain open on early release and no-school days to support working parents. After school, youth from kindergarten through high school arrive starting around 2:00 p.m., and every child is offered a small supper meal as soon as they get to the Club, followed by tutoring, enrichment, gym activities, outdoor play, arts, games, and time to connect with caring adult mentors.

Nutrition is a core part of our approach. BGCKV serves close to 100,000 meals annually, including breakfast, lunch, snacks, and supper for Club kids of all ages. This is made possible through annual private fundraising and Department of Education reimbursement for summer food programming. We also operate a free summer food program for all youth ages 18 and under, regardless of Club membership, and provide summer meals to the Gardiner Public Library and MSAD 11 summer school programs.

Developing Leadership and Opportunity for Teens

- BGCKV offers **free school-year Teen Center programming** that creates a safe space for teens to connect, grow, and lead.
- Our team raises **\$700,000+ each year** to fund teen staffing, supplies, field trips, and enrichment opportunities.
- Teens receive a **meal and structured support** after school, including tutoring, enrichment activities, and recreation.
- Through **Keystone Club**, a self-funded Club program, teens build leadership through community service, monthly meetings, and running the **Snack Shack** to support group experiences.
- Staff helps remove barriers through **transportation support**, field trips, and meaningful guest experiences.

A Community Hub and Partnerships

BGCKV is deeply integrated into the daily life of the community and MSAD 11. We maintain the sports field for use by MSAD 11 middle and high school teams as well as Club sports, and our spring and fall sports programs provide healthy physical activity opportunities for more than 700 youth through lacrosse, softball, soccer, and Gardiner Fire soccer. We also support MSAD 11 programming needs by hosting REACH students twice per month for full school days and providing lunch for those visits, and by welcoming MSAD 11 bus drivers for monthly meetings at the Club.

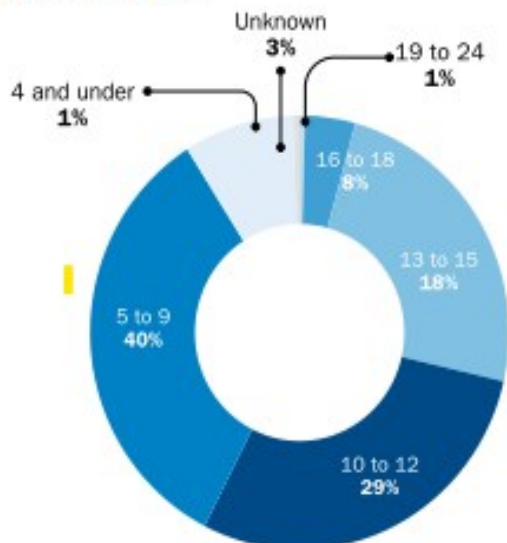

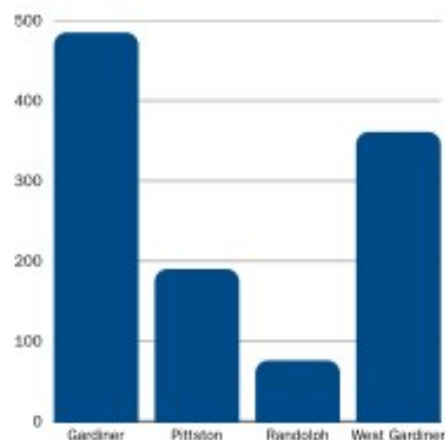

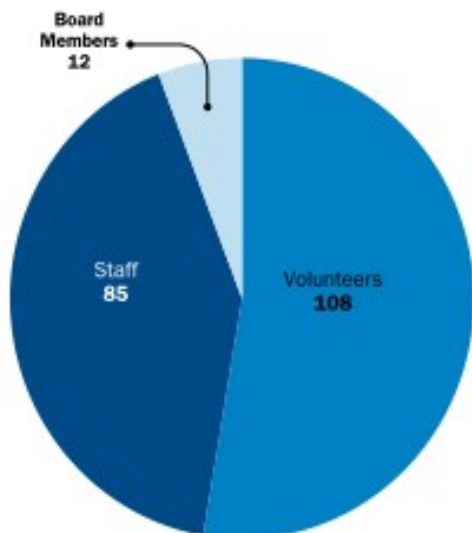

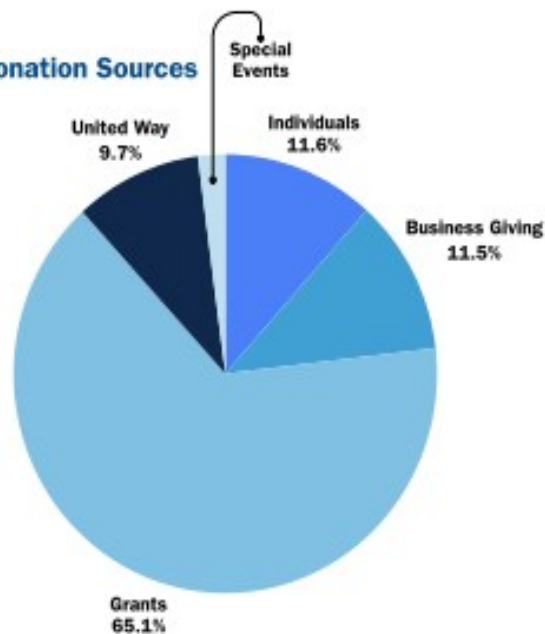

Boston Post Cane

The Boston Post Cane was established in 1909 by Edwin Grozier (Editor and Publisher of the Boston Post Newspaper, to honor the oldest living resident in participating municipalities. In 2025, the Gardiner City Council voted to participate in this tradition and Gloria Pollis was the first recipient. A replica of the cane resides in the lobby at City Hall alongside a plaque commemorating recipients. Recipients receive a pin.



Gloria Muriel Lavallee was born September 11, 1925 in Gardiner, Maine, the daughter of Ida Ouellette Lavallee and Theophile Lavallee. They resided on a farm on Libby Hill owned by Gloria's uncle, Henry Sansoucy, who was widowed, and Henry's three children. Gloria was the next to the youngest of Ida and Theophile's seven children. She spent her childhood on the farm, attended Gardiner schools and graduated from Gardiner High School. After graduation, Gloria went to work in the shoe shop. After the end of World War II, she met and fell in love with Robert Pollis, and they married in Gardiner on September 11, 1946.

Gloria had five children, Robert Jr.; Linda, who died as an infant, Daniel; Brian; and Michael. While the children were young, Gloria was a stay-at-home mom and housewife raising the four boys, a job that required lots of patience and love, gifts that Gloria is blessed with.

In their leisure time, Bob Sr. and Gloria would take the family camping where they would hike, fish and swim. The Moosehead Lake region was one of their favorite places.

In the very early years of their marriage Gloria and Bob rented an apartment on Spring Street, later they purchased a home on Middle Street where the children grew up. In the early 70's, Bob and Gloria purchased a home on Highland Avenue where Gloria still resides. The property afforded them the opportunity to have a garden where they grew vegetables which they shared generously with family, neighbors and friends.



Once the family was grown, Bob and Gloria would take their camper trailer and visit places of interest from Maine to Texas, always returning a little early to tend the garden! Gloria was excited to tell the family about the places they had been and the things they had seen.

After the kids were old enough, she worked for the State of Maine Retirement System until she retired.

In December of 2013 she suffered the loss of her husband, Bob, of 67 years. Gloria continues to live in the house she shared with Bob for so many wonderful years. Her sons Brian and Michael are always present and her other two sons are close enough to spend time with her frequently. Gloria especially delights in the visits from her nine grandchildren, eight great grandchildren and two great-great grandchildren plus many of her nieces and nephews. She is an avid fan of romance novels, often reading a book a night in front of her wood-stove. She retains all of the skills she developed while trying to feed four growing boys. She still makes whoopies pies, homemade jams, pies and cakes. She makes the best pickles and molasses cookies ever! Gloria continues to cook for the holidays and other special events by making multiple pies for Christmas and Thanksgiving and birthday cakes for celebrating with family.

Gloria has spent her entire 99 years, soon to be 100 years as a resident of the city of Gardiner, Maine.

Superintendent Report 2025-2026

As the new Superintendent of Schools for MSAD 11, I am honored to serve a community where students are at the heart of each decision we make. Our commitment is clear: every student matters, every day. I am inspired by the strong connections among our families, staff, and community partners, which create a supportive environment where students can thrive. Our teachers and staff demonstrate excellence, dedication, and care, ensuring high-quality learning experiences for all students. We remain focused on improving achievement while expanding opportunities that allow students to explore their interests and reach their full potential. This year has also been marked by remarkable drama performances, student contests, and exceptional athletic seasons which showcase the impressive knowledge, talent, and creativity of our students. As a celebration of our students and staff, we have invited them to highlight the incredible work happening in our schools at our School Board meetings this year.

MSAD 11 continues to see a decline in student enrollment. Over the past year, enrollment has fluctuated, reflecting an overall decrease ranging from 85 to 96 students. At the same time, state-assessed property valuations for all four towns in our district have increased by a combined 16.89%. This change directly impacts how education costs are shared among our communities. The proposed school budget reflects an overall increase of 2.16%, which accounts for a total cost increase of 6.19%. The impact to each municipality is: Gardiner - 8.10%, Pittston - 5.15%, Randolph - 3.55%, and West Gardiner - 5.48%.

The state funding formula for schools is expected to change, which should result in increased state subsidy for our district in the future. This shift will help offset the costs of operating our six schools and provide additional financial support. With these changes, we are hopeful it will ease budget pressures while allowing us to continue supporting student learning. Until then, we will commit to exploring ways to consolidate services and use our resources as efficiently as possible while maintaining a focus on what matters most - meeting the needs of our students.

Thank you for your support this year and for your ongoing support of our schools.

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to serve the people of Maine, and I welcome this opportunity to update you on the work that has taken place in the Senate over the past year. My staff and I have addressed numerous issues affecting our state, and I would like to share some of the progress that we have made.

Since my *Social Security Fairness Act* was signed into law in January 2025, the law has been fully implemented and restored earned retirement benefits to 2.8 million Americans. More than 25,000 Mainers have seen their monthly benefits increase and have been issued more than \$184.5 million in retroactive payments. I am proud that this legislation has improved the lives of many retired firefighters, teachers, police officers, and other public employees and their spouses.

I was honored to become the first Maine Senator in nearly a century to lead the Appropriations Committee. Since I took this role last January, Congress enacted full-year appropriations bills before December for the first time since 2018. These bipartisan bills included full-year funding for Military Construction and the Department of Veterans Affairs, the US Department of Agriculture, and the Food and Drug Administration. At my request, these bills included nearly \$35 million in Congressionally Directed Spending (CDS) for local projects across Maine that will improve fire stations and emergency services, update municipal buildings, and support upgraded facilities at the Maine National Guard and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard (PNSY) in Kittery. This funding builds on the nearly \$1.1 billion in CDS I have secured since 2021 for worthy projects that benefit local communities and nonprofits across 16 counties. As Chair, I remain committed to working to better ensure that federal spending and investments produce real results for the people of Maine.

I have also led other important legislative efforts this year that address problems many Mainers face. This includes bills that expand federal efforts to combat Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses and improve access to early testing for Alzheimer's disease. Provisions I authored to strengthen prevention, treatment, and recovery services for those struggling with substance use disorders and mental illness were included in the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Reauthorization Act* that was recently signed into law. An amendment I authored in this year's *National Defense Authorization Act* will increase apprenticeship opportunities at public shipyards like PNSY. That bill also includes more than \$400 million to support critical infrastructure improvements at PNSY and a well-deserved 3.8 percent pay raise for all our nation's service members.

In addition to advancing legislation, I worked to ensure that federal commitments to Maine were maintained and, when necessary, restored. I secured a seasonal employee exemption for Acadia National Park from the Administration's federal hiring freeze and from closure during the recent government shutdown. I protected local programs like Maine Sea Grant and global initiatives like the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR) from harmful funding cuts. I led the effort to resume enrollment at Maine Job Corps centers and fought for full funding for Maine's public schools this school year. I preserved funding for the University of Maine System and secured the restoration of funding to the Passamaquoddy Tribe at Pleasant Point and the Penobscot Nation. I protected low-income Mainers' access to key programs like LIHEAP and SNAP. Although I voted against the *One Big Beautiful Bill Act* due to my opposition to Medicaid cuts, I helped secure \$50 billion to support rural health providers through the legislation's Rural Health Transformation Program. Maine has been awarded \$190 million in the first year of this five-year grant program.

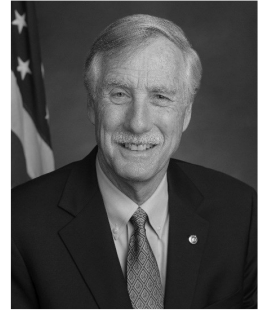
Throughout my Senate service, I have never missed a roll-call vote and have cast more than 9,850 consecutive votes—reflecting the Maine work ethic I bring to Washington. My continued ranking as most bipartisan Senator from the Lugar Center and Georgetown University is a testament to Maine's tradition of working with cooperation and respect.

What I've learned through our work together is that there are leaders all over Maine everywhere you look — people committed to service, to their communities and their country: Municipal officials and workers.
